Stanford University Departments of Urology and Developmental Biology are seeking applicants with a PhD, MD or MD/PhD for a tenure-track Assistant or Associate Professor position in the University Tenure Line at the School of Medicine. This joint recruitment builds on long-term interests and collaborations between the Department of Urology and Department of Developmental Biology and seeks to take advantage of the significant opportunities for research into the development of and diseases of the urinary and reproductive tracts. The faculty member will be housed in the Department of Urology and will be expected to be an active member of both departments. This is a broad search, and we are interested in applicants working in diverse fields, encompassing microbes through animal models to humans, and employing a wide-variety of molecular and genetic approaches as well as systems level biology, engineering, and computational science.
