

work in China and Zambia have stimulated him to pursue global health and education as his academic goals. Outside of medicine, he enjoys music, basketball and skiing.

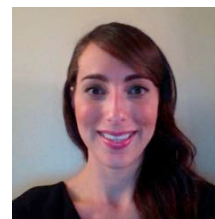
Tiffany Sinclair, MD - University of Pennsylvania

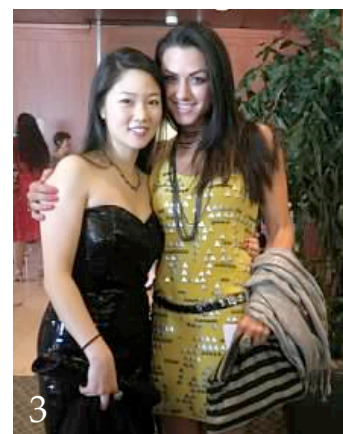

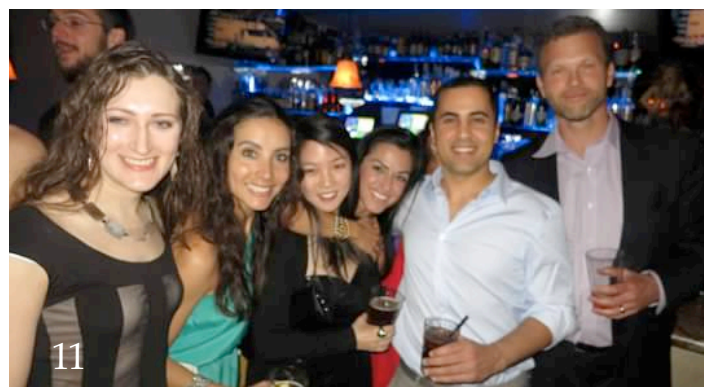

Tom Krummel becomes President of APSA

Dr. Tom Krummel, Emil Holman Professor and Chair of the Department of Surgery was installed as President of the American Pediatric Surgical Society, the foremost organizing body for North American pediatric surgeons. This is a singular honor among pediatric surgeons and recognizes established leaders and their many contributions to children's surgery. He will serve a one year term during which he will have a significant voice in shaping the future policies and procedures governing the art and science of surgery for children. Dr. Krummel has been Chair of the Department since 1999. Prior to coming to Stanford, he was Chair of the Department of Surgery at Penn State University. Our congratulations to Dr. Krummel.



Matt Mell wins ACS Scholarship

Dr. Matt Mell, Assistant Professor of Vascular Surgery was chosen to be the 2013 American College of Surgeons/Society of Vascular Surgery Scholar for Vascular Surgery Health Policy. The scholarship includes a "Leadership program in Health Policy and Management" course at Brandeis University this June. He will also travel to Washington, DC for the Leadership Conference and Advocacy Summit in Spring, 2014.

Dr. Mell earned his MD from Harvard University and came to Stanford for his general surgery residency (Class of 1992). He subsequently did a fellowship in vascular surgery at the University of Wisconsin where he was on faculty before we were lucky enough to recruit him back to Stanford.



Grace Chiou wins PSF research grant

Dr. Grace Chiou was awarded the National Endowment for Plastic Surgery Grant from the Plastic Surgery Foundation. The title of her proposal is entitled, "Tendon-bone composite tissue engineering in a rabbit model." Her advisor for the work is Dr. Jim Chang, Professor and Chief of the Division of Plastic Surgery. The grant awards her \$50,000 for her research year.

Dr. Chiou earned her undergraduate degree in biomedical engineering from Johns Hopkins University followed by medical school at Harvard Medical School. She matched into the Stanford general surgery residency and is about to complete her PGY2 training year. Her award marks another major accomplishment by this year's PGY2 class.



Joe Forrester wins award

Dr. Joe Forrester, PGY2, was given the 2013 Wilderness and Environmental Medicine Excellence in Peer Review Award. The Wilderness and Environmental Medicine Journal is the official publication of the Wilderness Medicine Society. This Peer Review Award recognizes service to the journal. It is especially noteworthy that this award has been given to someone still in training.

Dr. Forrester continues to excel during his surgical training. He is scheduled to depart at the end of this month to begin his fellowship at the Epidemic Intelligence Service of the US Centers for Disease Control. He will first undergo training at the headquarters of the CDC in Atlanta, GA prior to being stationed at the National Center for Emerging and Zoonotic Infectious Diseases in Ft. Collins, CO.

Two faculty members elected to ASA

The American Surgical Association was founded in 1880 and is the country's oldest and most prestigious surgical organization. Its membership includes the most prominent surgeons from the country's leading medical institutions as well as leading surgeons from around the world. Stanford has been privileged to have a large number of faculty members elected to this society. This spring, members of the ASA elected two more faculty to become Fellows of the Society, Drs. Wei Zhou and George Yang.



Dr. Wei Zhou is currently Associate Professor of Vascular Surgery and Chief of Vascular Surgery at the Palo Alto VA Hospital. Dr. Zhou went to medical school at New York Medical College in Valhalla, NY. She went on to complete her residency in general surgery at the

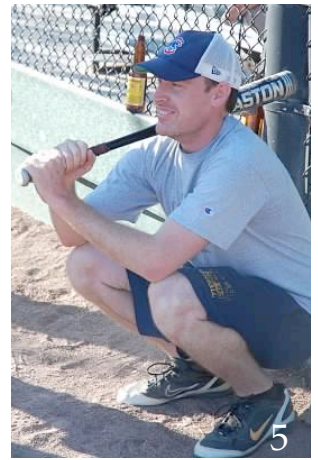
University of California, San Diego. This was followed by a fellowship in vascular surgery at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, TX under Dr. Michael DeBakey. She remained on faculty there until she was recruited to Stanford. Her research is on molecular mechanism of and potential treatments for intimal hyperplasia, and has been funded by the VA Merit System and the NIH.



Dr. George Yang is currently Associate Professor of Surgery at the Palo Alto VA Hospital. He went to medical school at Northwestern University prior to completing his general surgery residency at Stanford (Class of 2001). His research has focused on cellular responses to injury and has also been funded by the VA Merit System and the NIH.

Both join the many ASA Fellows already here at Stanford.

Resident-Faculty Softball Game

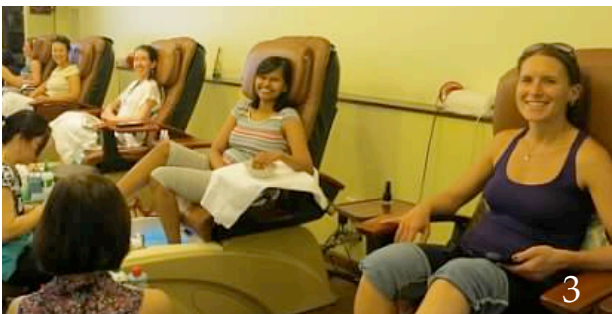


The residents dueled with the attendings on the softball field. Due to solid fielding, hitting, and a couple of ringers, the faculty won 10-6.

Resident Appreciation Day

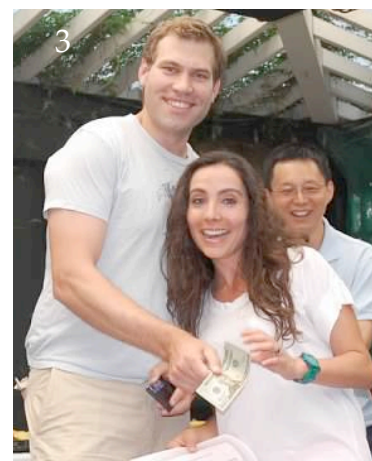
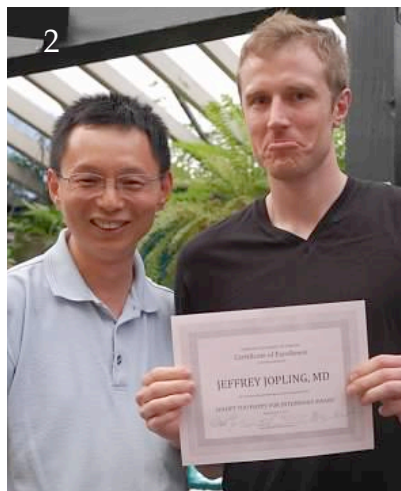
