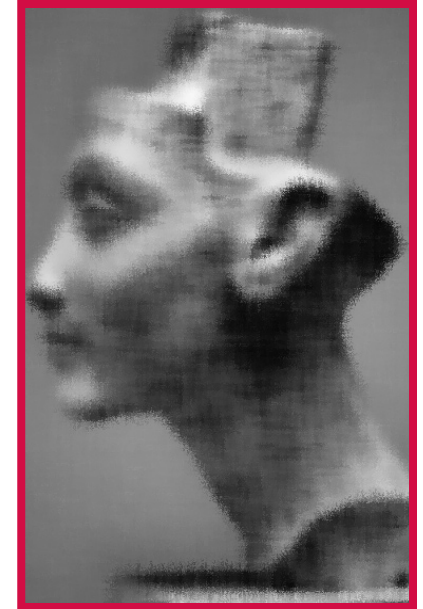
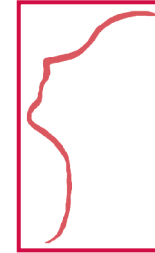

SYMPOSIUM OBJECTIVES

STATEMENT OF NEED

Facial Plastic Surgery and Rhinoplasty in particular comprises a significant portion of academic and private practice otolaryngology. Keeping pace with advances in this rapidly growing specialty can be challenging. This course aims to present new technologies and techniques to reinforce and enhance the skills of general otolaryngologists, rhinologists, residents nurses, facial plastic and reconstructive surgeons.
