



## **Daniel Saltman, MD, FACP**

Daniel Saltman is a board-certified internal medicine doctor and Fellow of the American College of Physicians. For over 20 years, he provided primary care for under-served populations at two Community Health Centers in Hawaii.

He has a longstanding interest in applied technology and has pioneered efforts in telemedicine and electronic information sharing in Hawaii. He developed the first tele-psychiatry initiative in the state. He wrote chapters for the University of Hawaii Telemedicine Curriculum. He was Principal Investigator on a National Library of Medicine Grant to train medical providers to effectively utilize information resources. He worked with the State Telehealth Access Network (STAN) on continuing medical education through weekly Grand Rounds. He was a member of the Holomua Project for information sharing between hospitals and CHCs.

In 2011, he became one of only a few primary care providers in the state to treat hepatitis C. For three years, he was Course Director for the Viral Hepatitis Hawaii -Update Symposia. In addition to excellent support in Hawaii, he received mentorship on hepatitis C and liver care through Project ECHO at the University of New Mexico. He became a founder of the ECHOHawaii program that was a collaboration between the Hawaii State Rural Health Association and UNM. He was the Course Director for their Endocrine/Diabetes series.

In 2017, he founded the Hawaii Learning Groups, LLC, to become a collaborating partner with Project ECHO and to continue this valuable work. He has been the Course Director for their Diabetes series. Under his leadership, the Hawaii Learning Groups has produced a 27-week series on complex diabetes care and a 4-week, 8-hour, mini-series on coordinated team care.
