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I. INTRODUCTION

Our interdisciplinary pediatric palliative care team is comprised of individuals from pediatrics (oncology, pain management, neonatology), nursing, psychology, social work, chaplaincy, child life, education and case management. We are a consultation service, and collaborate with the primary care team to assist children and their families in making decisions, setting goals and in developing a comprehensive palliative care plan. In addition, we also focus on optimal symptom management for the child and the psychological well being of all the children in the family, including the healthy siblings. We work closely with the Pediatric Pain and Symptom Management Team and Child Psychiatry/ Psychology Consultation-Liaison team as well as partnering with community agencies.

On this rotation, you will learn about pediatric palliative care through a comprehensive array of experiences: participation in initial and ongoing palliative and pain/symptom management consults; interdisciplinary team meetings and rounds; one-on-one meetings with members of our team; observational time in the LPCH School and the playroom; visits to George Mark Children's House (San Leandro), Pathways Kids (Sunnyvale) and Children's Recovery Center (Campbell); reading, discussion, and self-reflection.
