We are seeking applications for a full-time psychologist faculty member in the Clinician Educator line to provide clinical services exclusively to Stanford University varsity student-athletes.

The position is the result of a collaboration between Psychiatry & Behavioral Sciences and the Department of Athletics, Physical Education, and Recreation (DAPER), which have demonstrated a commitment to student-athlete mental health and well-being and shown consistent departmental support. The clinician will work as a member of the Stanford Sport Psychology team, which provides comprehensive sport psychology services to Stanford's 900+ student-athletes and 36 varsity teams. This is a full-time clinical position with an academic appointment in the Department of Psychiatry & Behavioral Sciences at the Stanford School of Medicine.

Essential job responsibilities include: assessing, formulating treatment plans, coordinating multidisciplinary care, and treating common psychological issues such as anxiety, depression, eating disorders, substance abuse, grief, trauma, and transitions. There also are opportunities to provide supervision and training to Clinical Psychology Post-Doctoral Fellows in Psychiatry & Behavioral Science's APA-accredited training program.

Qualified candidates must 1) have completed an APA-accredited doctoral degree in clinical or counseling psychology 2) completed an APA-accredited internship, 3) be licensed as a psychologist in good standing, and 4) have excellent clinical, supervisory, interpersonal, and organizational skills. California licensed preferred. If currently licensed in another state, must be California license-eligible as a psychologist. They must operate in a highly ethical manner with timely completion of required documentation. Flexibility, initiative, accountability and ability to work in a fast-paced collaborative environment are essential to this position. Experience working with college students and/or student-athletes from diverse backgrounds also is essential. Qualified candidates will have expertise in one or more of the following areas: depression, anxiety, substance use disorders, eating disorders, crisis management, or trauma. Candidates with specific expertise working with BIPOC student-athletes and/or who are experienced providing counseling and support to individuals from communities affected by racial trauma are strongly preferred.

The expected base pay range for this position is \$118,000-155,000, and is contingent on qualifications, experience and rank. This pay range reflects base pay, which is based on faculty rank and years in rank.
