For decades, the AAFP has recognized high-performing FMIGs as Programs of Excellence. The students, faculty, and staff at your institution who have dedicated their time and effort to building a strong FMIG have truly set themselves apart. I applaud your outstanding achievement.

FMIGs are highly valued by the family medicine community, and these student-led organizations become even more critical as the U.S. faces a growing primary care physician shortage.
