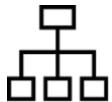

> Select disease under “Condition” AND/OR input a word/phrase in “Keyword”. Keyword may include name of gene mutation(s).  
> Other search options: age, trial phase, location, drug, doctor, trial ID.

## How a study contact can help

A study contact can be a resource for explaining more about the study. Before making a decision to have an oncology consult appointment at Stanford, the study contact can inform:

- General information about the study
- If the study is accepting new patients
- The study's eligibility requirements
- The steps for pre-screening (if any) and enrolling into the study

**The study contact cannot:** review medical records; provide medical advice; advise or discuss your medical treatment and clinical trial options; set up oncology consult appointments; provide patient case management.

## Steps for current Stanford Health Care patients

Speak with your oncologist to discuss all of your treatment options, including potential participation in a trial. A study contact can provide information you may need prior to speaking with your oncologist. ## Becoming a new patient at Stanford Cancer Center

If you are interested in choosing SHC for your care or an in-person second opinion with a physician, set up an appointment through the New Patient Coordinator. - IMS must be contacted to determine what resources and insurance may be needed. This is a fee-based service, which may be covered by the patient's insurance company or by paying out of pocket.
- IMS will review medical records, calculate costs, and arrange appointments.
